The outlet is, of course, turned up 16 inches, and at the beginning it discharged direct into the aerating chamber. A small sedimentation chamber was added to the tank in July, 1898, for the purpose of arresting the matters which appeared on the surface of the filters as scum, and into this chamber the sewage from the septic tank now flows before it goes to the aerator. The water content of the septic tank is 53,800 gallons. The aerator chamber contains a V notch for gauging the flow of sewage, and after passing it the sewage flows into a shallow trough 7 feet long and falls over the sides into the pipes which distribute it onto the filters. There is no screen for arresting the solids on any part of the works. There are...



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
